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
Self-advocates

Exercise their rights as citizens by communicating for and representing themselves



- Have a voice in decision-making in all areas of their daily lives and in public policy
- Participate in development of Individual Education Plan
- Set individual goals with plan of action and monitor plan

Defining Guardianship:



- Lacking the mental capacity to make good decisions and manage one's life
- Varying degrees of capacity determined by the court based on written medical or psychological reports
- -Guardianship of the estate
 - Stocks, bonds, real estate, money in the bank
 - Does not include SSI or other federal benefits

Rights and Powers of Guardianship:

- Operate motor vehicle
- Where to work
- Vote
- Where to live
- Deal with government benefits
- Enlist in military
- Enter contracts
- Handle fund to specific amount of

- Giving or withholding medical, psychiatric & dental treatment
- File lawsuits
- Defend claims and lawsuits
- Execute a Will or Power of Attorney
- Make gifts of property
- Consent to disclose personal information

Findings to determine Guardianship:

- 1. Court rules the person fully or partially incapacitated
- 2. Person's rights based on incapacity are terminated
- 3. Court determines a guardian should have authority over the person
- 4. Determines if the person wanting to be appointed guardian is qualified
- 5.Guardian is appointed
- 6. Yearly updates providing court information of what has occurred in the preceding year

Process Concerns:

- Less restrictive alternatives were explored
- School staff who provide information are lacking knowledge
- Conflict of guardianship and self-determination

Alternatives:

- Provide stakeholders with more information to make informed choices
- Consider autonomy as central factor ("The person acts (a) according to his or her own preferences, interests, and/or abilities (b) independently, free from undue external influence or interference." (Wehmeyer & Field 2007)
- Recognize interdependence to support autonomy
- Protective Payee or Representative
- Power of Attorney







Supported Decision Making:

- Guardianship Reform & Supported Decision Making in Texas
 - o Change term "Ward" to "person"
 - Bill of Rights for Wards and Proposed Wards
 - Right to live, work and play in most integrated settings, visit people of their choose
 - Appear before the court to express their preferences or concerns
 - Right to petition the court and due process
 - o Supported Decision-Making Agreement
 - Establish and informal alternative where person could choose people to help make and communicate decisions
 - o Alternatives to Guardianship
 - Direct court to determine whether alternatives could meet the needs of person
 - Duties of Guardians
 - Calls of guardians to visit an institutionalized person every month and respond to calls, emails or letters from that person
 - Limits of Guardianship with Services and Supports
 - o Guardianship and Decisions about Residence
 - Individuals under guardianship should, if possible, be able to make decisions about where to live
- National Guardianship Network Standard
 - Incorporation of supported decision-making components into existing system
 - Ouardians engage in person centered planning to "discover, understand and clearly describe the unique characteristics of the individual with the aim of ensuring that an individual is supported in a web of relationships, is valued for his or her contributions to the community and has control over his or her own life."

Person Centered Transition Assessment

- Use skills from Person Centered Thinking to improve transitional outcomes
- Teaches and encourages self-advocacy and decision making
- Assesses the student's abilities, resources and needs
- Ascertains student and parent goal(s) so that school staff can support/facilitate the identified goals for work, living, playing and self-advocacy

Supported Decision Making

- Needs met by arranging extra help with activities such as paying bills, in-home support, job coach
